



# **ACTIVITY REPORT FOR 2022 AND RESULTS OBTAINED**

## **INTRODUCTION**

**Global Commission for Cultural Investment and Illumination for Restoration** was created as a non-profit, Non-political, Non-religious, humanitarian, youth and women led Association on the 12<sup>th</sup> of June 2006 during a general assembly meeting, with head office at PNEU ROAD MAYORS STREET MILE 3 NKWEN – Bamenda, Mezam Division of the North West Region of Cameroon; but was legalized (Declared) on the 26<sup>th</sup> of December 2012 by the Senior Divisional Officer (SDO) for Mezam Division, with registration number: 52/E.29/1111/Vol.8/ALPAS.

**Global Commission for Cultural Investment and Illumination for Restoration (GLOCIR)** has branches in Five (05) Regions of Cameroon namely:

This Evaluation Report of Activities for **GLOCIR** shows the activities carried out by GLOCIR in 2022, the impact, challenges and the results obtained on the field. Worthy of note here is the fact that GLOCIR uses a **Participatory Approach and community driven intervention** with all actors involved especially working with the Cameroon state institutions in all our interventions. GLOCIR carried out these activities within Nine (09) thematic areas namely:

- 1) Health Programs
- 2) Protection Programs
- 3) Livelihood and Economic Empowerment Programs
- 4) Environment, climate change and mitigation Programs
- 5) Democracy and Governance programs
- 6) Shelter and NFI programs
- 7) Arts and Culture Programs
- 8) Humanitarian and Charity Programs

And

- 9) Education Programs

Working with women, girls, boys and men with and without disabilities. The following activities were carried out during 2022:

## **ACTIVITY SUMMARY AND OBTAINED RESULTS**

In line with the objectives of the creation of GLOCIR, in the objective to

### **A) ENCOURAGE THE PROMOTION OF CULTURES THAT RESPECT HUMAN RIGHTS**

The major field activities carried out by **Global Commission for Cultural Investment and Illumination for Restoration** during this period included the following projects:

- 1) *Using cultural appropriate communications for sensitisation, disease control and surveillance through women led cultural associations in target communities in the North West and South West regions of Cameroon.*

#### **PROJECT SUMMARY:**

This project implemented by GLOCIR designed culturally appropriate IEC strategies and various health service delivery for disease control and surveillance through women led and women rights organizations in the following outcomes:

Outcome 1: Specific challenges, gaps and barriers to health systems exclusion, Promotion, prevention and empowerment efforts posed by misinformation, skepticism, and fear in missed out communities are identified and responses tailored according to their needs.

Outcome 2: women and girls aged between 15 and 35 years selected from local authorities and their community collaborators, local organizations, women led and women rights organizations, associations and youth led groups based on identified needs are trained on various modules on community centered health Promotion, prevention and empowerment and handbook manuals distributed for continues peer to peer learning and transfer of knowledge through created community focused groups within partnered local organizations and collaborators.

Outcome 3: Capacities of health facility leads and personnel are trained on health service delivery outreach to rural and vulnerable populations in these communities, partnerships and engaging local leadership and collaborators in Promoting their health and well-being through targeted prevention and empowerment efforts to counter barriers to HIV, malaria and tuberculosis treatment and retention posed by misinformation, skepticism, and fear and bolster treatment coverage generally and strengthen treatment retention decision making by reinforcing the capacities of local rural health personnel on monitoring and evaluating geared to enforce the impact, mitigate risk factors and guarantee community engagement.

Outcome 4: Community health clinic model health service delivery is piloted in this specific population and their communities, reinforcing the capacity of rural clinics or centers to improve health coverage, support local partnerships, and foster a stronger bond between communities and health facilities to strengthen inclusion of key and vulnerable population to existing health systems and service delivery.

- 2) *Integrating cultural diversity in social cohesion for persons affected by the crises and promoting cultures that respect human rights in living together in the North West, South West and West Region of Cameroon.*

### **PROJECT SUMMARY:**

In this project, GLOCIR mapped the current peace processes in Cameroon particularly in the North west, south west and west regions of Cameroon, both at the national and local levels, identifying gaps, barriers, and challenges that hinder youth participation, and suggesting practical solutions to overcome these obstacles by engaging particular affected population to integrating cultural diversity to social cohesion and peace building. This intervention included:

- 1) Stakeholder Identification

Objective: Identify and document key stakeholders involved in the ongoing peace processes at both national and local levels. This will include: Government officials and representatives from national, regional, and local authorities. Civil society organizations (CSOs) and youth groups involved in peace building. Community leaders, religious leaders, traditional rulers, and elders.

- 2) International actors and partners engaged in mediation or peace building efforts, such as the United Nations, international NGOs, and diplomatic missions.

Expected Outcome: A comprehensive list of stakeholders with their roles, responsibilities, and involvement in peace processes, as well as an analysis of their contributions and influence.

- 3) Documentation of Current Peace Processes

Objective: Document the existing peace processes, including: Frameworks and mechanisms established for peace building and conflict resolution (e.g., formal peace agreements, dialogue platforms, and mediation efforts). Local, national, and regional peace initiatives that are operational or have been proposed. Any relevant initiatives by non-state actors, including grassroots peace building programs, local dialogues, and inter-community reconciliation efforts.

Expected Outcome: A detailed description of the current peace processes in Cameroon, outlining the goals, structures, participants, and challenges faced by each initiative.

- 4) Representation of Youth in Peace Processes

Objective: Assess the level of representation and participation of youth in peace processes at both national and local levels. This will involve: Mapping the roles that youth have played (or are playing) in the peace processes. Identifying any underrepresentation of youth voices in key decision-making bodies or initiatives. Exploring the roles of female youth specifically, in light of gender dynamics and inclusivity in peace building.

Expected Outcome: A thorough assessment of youth involvement in the peace processes and identification of areas where youth voices, particularly female youth, are lacking or underrepresented.

- 5) Barriers to Youth Participation

Objective: Identify the barriers and challenges that hinder the active participation of youth in peace processes. These could include: Socio-Cultural Barriers: Societal attitudes toward youth participation, cultural norms, and gender roles that limit youth involvement, particularly among female youth. Political and Economic

Barriers: Political instability, lack of access to decision-making platforms, and limited economic opportunities prevent youth from engaging in peace building activities. Structural Barriers: Institutional limitations, lack of youth-friendly policies, and exclusion from formal peace dialogues and peace negotiations.

Expected Outcome: A clear identification of the key barriers to youth participation in peace processes, with a focus on the specific challenges faced by youth in conflict-affected regions like the Northwest and Southwest of Cameroon.

Expected Outcome: A well-structured, insightful, and actionable report that will be shared with key stakeholders, project partners, and relevant governmental and non-governmental organizations.

- 3) *Dispelling cultural myths for access to vaccines in conflict settings, Health Financing and citizenship participation project in the North West and South West Regions of Cameroon.*

**PROJECT SUMMARY:**

During the COVID 19 period, Cameroon generally in its health systems service delivery lacked an effective community centered rapid health response mechanism including data collection and management strategy to strategically inform local community health intervention designs and approaches to access on health services delivery particularly COVID 19 vaccine uptake which further exposed hard to reach communities including urban centers to further risk and impedes health and wellbeing and exposes them to undisclosed danger. In this, GLOCIR with its expertise designed rapid vaccine service community centered perspectives to enable the Cameroon public health strategy by dispelling cultural myths and misinformation in particular settings including conflict, hard to reach and sub populations including a community centered health financing and citizens participation in health systems service delivery.

- 4) *Integrating cultural differences in promoting education for internally displaced persons in the west region.*

**PROJECT SUMMARY:**

This project implemented by GLOCIR is a transformative initiative with an outcome to uplifting vulnerable women and girls to economic and social autonomy by providing tools and resources necessary to achieve financial independence and self-reliance and with an output to reinforce their capacities to self-finance their education minimizing the effects displacements imparted in their education and livelihood through adapting cultural appropriate self-social integration measures in the receiving communities and enabling living together to normalcy in various recipient communities in target response areas. GLOCIR employed a tailored outreach by providing an integrated service package through women cohesion spaces created in the host communities that will empower women economically have a ripple effect on families (Their children), communities, and society as a whole. By focusing on skill development, access to financial resources, and creating supportive networks, the project seeks to break the cycle of vulnerability and poverty that disproportionately affects women and engage an effective women centered strategy to engage communities and bring a community-focused perspective to nurture a collaborative dialogue resonating deeply within communities and counter the barriers to social cohesion and peace posed by misinformation, skepticism, and fear and promote economic and social autonomy of women.

This projects falls within the rapid response mechanism (RPA) sources (2020-2024) for Cameroon and to

strengthen various mechanisms put in place by the government of Cameroon to assist vulnerable women and girls including

1) The National Action Plan: In 2017, Cameroon launched a National Action Plan on the Women, Peace and Security agenda.

2) The National Development Strategy: The 2020-2030 National Development Strategy considers gender issues

3) The UNSCDF (United Nations Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework): The 2022-2026 UNSCDF has a stand-alone Gender Outcome adopted in September 2021

and

4) UN Security Council Resolution (UNSCR) 1325 on Women, Peace and Security (WPS)

The following activities were carried out throughout 2022:

- Economic empowerment to beneficiaries, business plan development, book keeping training and psychosocial support to beneficiaries in the project integrating cultural diversity in social cohesion for persons affected by the crises and promoting cultures that respect human rights in living together.
- COVID 19 response to the NW (North West) region in the project using cultural appropriate communications for sensitisation, disease control and surveillance through women led cultural associations in target communities in the North West and South west Region of Cameroon.
- Project on dispelling cultural myths for access to vaccines in conflict settings, Health Financing and citizenship participation project
- Training sessions with partner organisation on disability mainstreaming and disaggregated data in the project dispelling cultural myths to disability.
- Trainings and workshop in security, safety and access in Humanitarian context in the project promoting cultures which respect human rights in Humanitarian context.
- Training of educational leads of integrating cultural differences in promoting education for internally displaced persons in the west region.

## **RESULTS OBTAINED**

- 1) In the project "Using cultural appropriate communications for sensitisation, disease control and surveillance through women led cultural associations in target communities in the North West and South West regions of Cameroon".

In this project GLOCIR implemented Community health clinic model health service delivery to specific population and their communities, reinforcing the capacity of rural clinics or centers to improve health coverage, support local partnerships, and foster a stronger bond between communities and health facilities to strengthen inclusion of key and vulnerable population to existing health systems and service delivery in all key target project response areas.

- 2) *In the project “Integrating cultural diversity in social cohesion for persons affected by the crises and promoting cultures that respect human rights in living together in the North West, South West and West Region of Cameroon”.*

GLOCIR, through a Spotlight Initiative (Evidence based Population Sampling human centered systems research approach) conducted desk reviews, key informants’ interviews, focused group discussions and an integrated household survey/questionnaires administered by recruiting participants through the snow ball technique aimed at Social monitoring, Conducting analysis, and Evaluating and assessing progress including reporting. The sample population of the study will focus beyond 15-19-year-olds up to ageing population 59 years plus and to directly address adolescents who are 10-19 years-old and adults 20-45 years in which the MEAL tools will capture key indicators on how social media affects peace processes, the mental health challenges faced by young adolescents and how do these affect their contributions to peace building initiatives, How peace building solutions initiatives vary by subpopulations, How a comprehensive community centered youth peace building initiative can be strengthened among young adolescents youths and women, the most critical modifiable factors that should be addressed to promote peace, Including source of information of peace processes, How young adolescents, youths and women can be meaningfully engaged in the co-design of programs and services that meet their needs, and What do adolescents consider as positive aspects of their lives and how they can access to training and resources to engage community centered peace processes.

- 3) *In the Project “Dispelling cultural myths for access to vaccines in conflict settings, Health Financing and citizenship participation project in the North West and South West Regions of Cameroon”.*

GLOCIR designed and implemented an effective community centered rapid health response mechanism including data collection and management strategy to strategically inform local community health intervention designs and approaches to access on health services delivery particularly COVID 19 vaccine uptake in hard to reach communities including urban centers. In this, GLOCIR with its expertise designed rapid vaccine service community centered perspectives to enable the Cameroon public health strategy by dispelling cultural myths and misinformation in particular settings including conflict, hard to reach and sub populations including a community centered health financing and citizens participation in health systems service delivery.

- 4) *In the Project “Integrating cultural differences in promoting education for internally displaced persons in the west region”.*

In this project, GLOCIR achieved the results of reintegrating and empowering target population vulnerable women and girls to economic and social autonomy by providing tools and resources necessary to achieve financial independence and self-reliance and with an output to reinforce their capacities to self-finance their education minimizing the effects displacements imparted in their education through adapting cultural appropriate self-social integration measures in the receiving communities and enabling living together to normalcy in various recipient communities in target response areas.

## CHALLENGES EXPERIENCED IN THE FIELD.

The only challenge experience in 2022 in the field by GLOCIR is security, access and operational presence in this various communities. Because of this challenges outreach efforts that will promote the health of vulnerable populations and well-being through targeted prevention and empowerment efforts and strengthening their role health outcomes to HIV, Tuberculosis and Malaria was limited because many health facilities loosed operational presence due to the ongoing conflict, as a results GLOCIR was forced to pilot mobile clinics.
